| 25 | Esquire. On May 6th, 2024, the Honorable Nancy L. Butts,   |  |  |  |

President Judge of 29 Judicial District of the 1 2 Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, appointed the undersigned 3 Committee to prepare a Report and Resolutions memorializing the life of L. Craig Harris for submission 4 5 to the Court at a public ceremony on June 6, 2024. 6 Accordingly, your Committee respectfully submits 7 the following Report and Resolutions: L. Craig Harris was born on November 4, 1944, in 8 9 Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, the son of Leonard C. Harris 10 and Elizabeth Craig Harris. He died on April 10, 2024, at 11 his home in Loyalsock Township at the age of 79, after an 12 extended illness. 13 Craig grew up in Lock Haven, Pennsylvania, with 14 his two younger twin brothers, Paul and Reid. 15 He was an active Boy Scout and first displayed his 16 musical talents by playing the bugle at Camp Kline along 17 Pine Creek. 18 Craig graduated in 1962 from Lock Haven High 19 School and then attended Allegheny College receiving a 20 B.A. degree in economics. In 1969 he received his Juris 21 Doctor degree from the University of Pittsburgh Law 22 School. 23 Craig met his wife, Martha Brockway Harris, who 24 survives him, in 1973 in the Lycoming County Courthouse where she worked with MHMR. They were married on May 17, 25 CAMALA JORDAN OFFICIAL COURT REPORTER, LYCOMING COUNTY

1975, and together shared almost 49 years of marriage.

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They have two children, Andrew Craig Harris and Peter Brockway Harris, as well as three grandchildren, Juliet Rachel Harris, Mac Andrew Harris, and Sophia Facao Harris. Craig is also survived by his daughters-in-law, Elizabeth Harris and Celia Alves Falcao Harris, and brothers, Paul Harris and Reid Harris.

8 Craig served honorably in the United States Army 9 including a posting at Walter Reed Army Medical Center in 10 Washington, D.C.

11 Professionally, Craig was first employed as a 12 staff attorney for the Small Business Administration. He 13 then was an associate with Attorney Joseph Rider from 1973 14 through 1979. Thereafter, he joined with Attorney Clyde 15 Carpenter in Jersey Shore, Pennsylvania. Subsequent to 16 retirement of Clyde Carpenter, Jr., Craig and Attorney Martin Flayhart were in partnership beginning in 1984. 17 18 Craig continued the practice of law there until he retired 19 in 2019.

Craig was a member of many professional and civic organizations, having been a past president of the Lycoming Law Association and the Jersey Shore Area Chamber of Commerce, and a member of the Jersey Shore Hospital Board, the Community and Housing Development Corporation of Jersey Shore, the Jersey Shore Industrial Development

Corporation, the West Branch Child Abuse Counsel, and a 1 2 40-year member of the Jersey Shore Lions Club. 3 Craig was an avid outdoorsman, who especially enjoyed hiking in the Pine Creek Valley, on the Loyalsock 4 5 Trails, and in Sullivan County, where family often spent time in the summers at Eagles Mere. Craig also loved 6 7 biking and playing tennis and golf. 8 Craig and Marty hosted several foreign exchange students at their home, and referred to them as "their 9 10 other children". They enjoyed traveling to other 11 countries, often to meet in later years with these 12 students who had stayed with them. 13 Having many varied interests, Craig was a 14 volunteer AYSO soccer referee, as well as a member of his 15 church choir and a Williamsport Civic Chorus. 16 Craig will be remembered for his welcoming nature, 17 and his consistently positive view of life. 18 Your Committee recommends the adoption of the 19 following Resolutions: 20 Now therefore be resolved that as a result of the 21 passing of L. Craig Harris, the Bar of Lycoming County has 22 lost a respected and conscientious member; the community 23 at large has lost an energetic and valued participant; his 24 friends and acquaintances have lost a fine gentleman; and 25 his family has lost a devoted, kind, and loving husband, CAMALA JORDAN OFFICIAL COURT REPORTER, LYCOMING COUNTY

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father, and grandfather.

Be it further resolved, that we, the undersigned, joined by all the members of the Lycoming County Bar, who recognize and mourn the passing of L. Craig Harris. Be it further resolved, that this Court and this Bar do hereby extend to L. Craig Harris's widow, children, and grandchildren our deep and heartfelt expression of sympathy.

9 And be it finally resolved that this Report and 10 Resolutions be spread at length upon the records of the 11 Court of Common Pleas of Lycoming County, and that copies 12 be sent to the widow and children of L. Craig Harris, and 13 published in the Lycoming Reporter.

19 MR. FLAYHART: Thank you.

20**THE COURT:** Thank you. If you would like to21say a few words.

22 MR. FLAYHART: At this time, we will open it 23 for members of the committee and anyone else who would 24 like to say a few words with regard to Craig. As the 25 chairman of the committee, I will claim seniority and

1 deliver my brief remarks right now.

2 Craig Harris and I practiced law together for 35 It was a most enjoyable and rewarding association. 3 vears. As has been mentioned in the resolutions that were just 4 5 read, he had a welcoming nature and a consistently positive view of life. He was a most pleasant person; 6 7 always willing to engage in friendly conversations with 8 anyone he met. He had an equanimity of disposition that was hardly ever disturbed. 9

10 The only exception that I can recall to this trait 11 involved food. And I hope you're paying attention, Ludo. 12 At one time, we had an associate in our office who would 13 sometimes bring his Labrador Retriever dog to work. Craig 14 was most particular about his food. Not the dogs, but 15 his. He had brought a sandwich from home for lunch and 16 carefully placed it on his desk. Having been called away for a minute, he returned to find that the dog had eaten 17 18 most of his lunch. Craig was not pleased.

Other than that, the office proceeded smoothly with Craig's wife, Marty, having been with us the entire time as our estate paralegal, which she continues to do so today. I know that Craig adored his wife and his family. His life has been a blessing to all who knew him and he will be missed.

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THE COURT: Mr. Greevy.

MR. GREEVY: May it please the Court, Marty and 1 2 her family, certainly bar colleagues, and the many friends 3 and family of Craig who that are here today. Initially I think of the parallels of Craig and my lives. Both -- we 4 5 were both World War, II, babies. Sons of our families born in 1944 a few months apart. I have a couple months 6 7 on him. I was August, he was November. 8 We went on to graduate from high school in 1962. 9 We went on respectively and graduated college in 1966, 10 Craig at Allegheny, which was my second choice for 11 college, but I ended up out in Ohio at that point. And 12 both respectively then went to law school, both graduating 13 in 1969.

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14 I never knew Craig by his first name. We always 15 referred to him as Craig and I'm sure most of us here 16 agree that at that point. I have been known as Skip, and although Judge Kieser at my swearing in had noted that my 17 18 name but for -- thereafter, rather than Charles, would be 19 CF, but that never stuck and the judge knows that it 20 doesn't. We both enjoyed our times together and certainly 21 times with our colleagues throughout the county.

After Craig served in the U.S. Army after law school, including at Walter Reed Hospital as -- as noted in our resolutions. He joined Joe Rider and then went on to practice with Clyde Carpenter, Jr., after both Clyde,

Sr., and Catherine had passed away. So I think back, certainly he had two excellent mentors and those two gentleman had formed a real basis for his general and enjoyable practice thereafter. They were both excellent mentors to a great number of people and certainly to Craig. It showed throughout his practice.

Would often run into Craig here at the courthouse,
particularly once he had gone up to Jersey Shore. And I
think all of us knew and certainly his Jersey Shore
colleagues know that he was a mainstay up in Jersey Shore
with all of the activities and the responsibilities he
took on there.

He liked to talk and share stories. I always would run into him downtown here or in the courthouse, always had a few minutes to chat back and forth either whatever was going on in practice or what was going on with friends and other folks that we knew. He was a joy to meet on the street and to chat, although you knew, as noted, that he liked to talk.

He and Marty bought a home here in Williamsport at one point on Lincoln Avenue and I had drawn the deed for that particular property and knew the history because they had been lifetime friends. And actually, it's right next to where all the sporting fields are now at Lycoming College. When we would meet, I often shared some of the

stories of that home with Marty and normally it would be
 with Craig also.

3 My son, Chad, then did attend Allegheny College and graduated in the 90's. After that time, when I would 4 5 run into Craig once in a while, I mentioned how he was 6 doing and he would inquire how my son happened to be doing 7 at Allegheny, again, reaffirming where we ought to be going to eat and where we ought to be enjoying ourselves 8 while we were in Meadville. We would talk about our --9 10 certainly our adventures here in the practice, but 11 certainly on a very friendly note.

As Martin noted and highlighted, Craig can be remembered for his welcoming nature and consistent view of life. His jovial spirit and certainly he was generally fun to be around and to be with at any point.

16 His talents were many. Certainly they're 17 highlighted here. Certainly one of them is his musical 18 background stemming maybe from Camp Kline right up to the 19 quartet that he and Ben Landon and two other fellows, 20 Bob -- Bob was one the main one -- would be long 21 remembered because they were often here at a number of the Law Association ceremonies, programs, and whatever. 22 We could always depend upon the quartet of lawyers to help 23 24 and make the evening even more helpful. He also was noted 25 that he was in his church choir and the Williamsport civic

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choir.
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I attended his church service at Messiah Lutheran Church on April 17th and I would say it was truly a well attended and certainly a high tribute to what Craig had built up during his lifetime with his friends and everything else. And helped to highlight his interests, his talents, and his dedication to his community and to his family.

I want to end my thoughts with something from that 9 10 funeral service. In his prayer card was this statement 11 from the Bible and I thought that it was most appropriate 12 so often, but certainly as we think about Craig. For 13 everything there is a season, and a time for everything 14 under Heaven, a time for sharing; a time for caring; a 15 time for loving; a time for giving; a time for 16 remembering; a time for parting.

Certainly Craig, as said on the prayer card, made 17 18 everything beautiful in its time, for everything that you 19 do will remain forever. Certainly we see Craig's heritage 20 in many of the organizations in the community, 21 particularly in Jersey Shore. But certainly Craig 22 certainly reflected those items in that prayer card. His 23 life talents and dedication will remain with us all of our 24 lives and throughout all of our days. Thank you. 25 Thank you. Mr. Landon, did you THE COURT: CAMALA JORDAN

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1 wish to say a few words?

2 MR. LANDON: Thank you. May it please the 3 Court. I knew Craig Harris or many years, primarily in 4 connection with his extracurricular activities. As those 5 of you who are long-time attendees at law day and assorted 6 fans and groupies of the law day singers, for many years 7 we did the Star Spangled Banner at law day here in the 8 this courtroom.

And the most remarkable thing about Craig Harris 9 10 is that he was always happy, he was always in a good mood. 11 He was -- if you -- I saw Craig on a handful of occasions 12 professionally, but regularly in connection with Craig's 13 extracurricular interests and Craig was always ready to 14 qo, he was always happy, he always had a smile on his 15 face, he was always looking forward to it, always up to 16 it.

17 And as has been mentioned, Craig liked to talk. 18 And on a number of occasions when we would get together to 19 prepare for things, Craig would be talking in lieu of 20 focusing on what we were supposed to be doing and he would 21 have no idea where we were in the piece of music that we 22 were working on. And on a number of occasions, in fact, 23 he would discover that he had the wrong piece of music out 24 because he was too busy talking to someone else to pay 25 attention to what he should have been doing.

But if you were one of those lawyers who was 1 2 having too good a day, when everything was going too well, 3 and you just needed that glass of vinegar to bring yourself down, Craig Harris is the last person you would 4 5 ever want to talk to. Thank you. THE COURT: Thank you. Ms. Pulizzi. 6 7 MS. PULIZZI: Thank you. May it please the 8 Court. Craig touched the lives of everyone he met. I had 9 the privilege of meeting him at a very young age. His son 10 Andy and I went to preschool together so our parents had 11 to carpool. So he used to drive me school occasionally. 12 Little did I know that years later I would have the honor 13 of becoming his law partner. 14 His love for talking not only entertained us, but 15 I think touched each one of us in a profound way. We will 16 miss his stories and his presence at the office. May his 17 words to continue to inspire us and may his memory live on 18 in his stories we share. Thank you. 19 THE COURT: Thank you. I will accept the 20 Report and Resolution of the committee and I'll enter the 21 following order. 22 And now this 6th day of June, 2024, in 23 consideration of the Resolutions presented by the 24 Committee appointed to draft the Resolutions in the death 25 of L. Craig Harris, Esquire, the said Resolutions are CAMALA JORDAN OFFICIAL COURT REPORTER, LYCOMING COUNTY

adopted and it is ORDERED and DIRECTED that the 1 2 Resolutions herewith submitted and the attached be adopted 3 as an official expression of the Lycoming County Law Association and this Court, and that the same be spread 4 upon the records of the Court, and the copies of this 5 resolution be delivered to the family of L. Craig Harris. 6 7 It is further ORDERED and DIRECTED that said Resolution be 8 entered at large upon the record of the Court and that it 9 be printed in the Lycoming reporter.

10 It's at this time that we usually ask -- I usually 11 ask my colleagues if they would like to say a few words. 12 I would just point out that Judge Tira would have liked to 13 have been here, but his daughter is graduating from high 14 school this evening, so he was unable to be here. But 15 I'll call upon Judge Linhardt.

16 JUDGE LINHARDT: Thank you. I first wanted to take a moment to thank Craig's family for being here. I 17 18 think it's important and I'm grateful that you're here 19 because while it's clear that you loved Craig very much 20 and that he loved his family very much, I think it's nice 21 that you had an opportunity to hear how his professional 22 colleagues felt about him as well. And so thank you for coming to be a part of that. 23

And so we've heard from those who have spoken already that Craig has been described as pleasant,

positive, jovial, adored his family, adored by his family, 1 2 an avid storyteller, always happy, and in a good mood. 3 None of those descriptions came as a surprise to me or things that I did not already know or have heard about 4 5 Craiq. What I did learn, however, today was that 6 7 apparently Craig and the law day singers have groupies. That was a surprise to me. 8 But again, I want to thank all of you who are in 9 10 attendance today who get to share in our thoughts and in 11 our memories of Craig and our respect for him as a 12 colleague and a professional and a friend. So thank you. 13 THE COURT: Thank you. Judge Carlucci. 14 JUDGE CARLUCCI: Craig was a Boy Scout and as 15 many of you, I'm a Boy Scout. He and I both camped at 16 Camp Kline. He was a bugle player and a good one, I was a trumpet player and and a lousy one. 17 18 And for those of you who have been involved in the 19 scouting program, you know the scouting program has a law, 20 12-points. Trustworthy, loyal, helpful, friendly, 21 courteous, kind, obedient, cheerful, thrifty, brave, 22 clean, and reverent. I am fairly confident that if we 23 reviewed each of those 12 elements of the scout law with 24 members who are here, we would discover the Craig's life 25 reflected every one of those 12 elements of the scout law. CAMALA JORDAN OFFICIAL COURT REPORTER, LYCOMING COUNTY

I would lake to volunteer for cheerful. This guy 1 2 had cheerful written all over him. And I've been around a lot of Boy Scouts since age 11. I've been a Boy Scout for 3 almost 50 -- yeah, 50 years. And Boy Scouts are 4 consistently trustworthy and loyal, usually helpful, 5 sometimes friendly, sometimes not. Frequently are not 6 7 cheerful. That is, it takes a while to warm them up. He had his cheerful going on every minute of every day. 8 And 9 his -- being around him lifted spirits. And I don't know 10 anybody looking for a glass of vinegar, but I'm gonna tell 11 you that talking to him lifted your day every time. And I 12 know we will all miss him. Thank you. 13 THE COURT: Thank you. Judge Gardner. 14 **JUDGE GARDNER:** Thank you, Judge Butts. Ι 15 initially met Mr. Harris through the practice of law when 16 our paths crossed. Initially, I don't specifically 17 recall, but I didn't know him well really until shortly 18 after opening a business on the Golden Strip, which for 19 those of you who don't know, had nothing to do with the 20 practice of law. But this incidentally is where I had the 21 opportunity to get to know Mr. Harris on a more personal 22 level. 23 He was a customer. We discussed the news, we 24 talked law, we discussed problems with his car. I will 25 always remember Mr. Harris for his smile. It was CAMALA JORDAN

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welcoming, it was warm, and it put you at ease.

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2 My last distinct memory was when I was campaigning for DA and I was going door to door. And for those of you 3 who have not had the pleasure of campaigning, not every 4 5 door you knocked on were you met by someone with a smile on their face. But when I knocked on Mr. Harris's door --6 7 and at the time, it was unbeknownst to me that he lived 8 there -- that door was opened and he had a smile on his 9 face and so did his wife, Marty. My condolences to the 10 family. Thank you.

11 **THE COURT:** One of the things that happen 12 sometimes when we want to have a memorial service is we 13 can't get everyone together. And I think that Craig's 14 wife having worked in the system and understanding how 15 people come from all over and file papers and do 16 everything, it's -- we've kind of lost that community 17 spirit and that small town kind of feeling, because we do 18 have so many attorneys that come from all over.

But one of the things that I've always remembered about this event, not only is the participation of family, which I'm grateful that everyone including the extended family member of the exchange student are able to be present and, as Judge Linhardt said, hear what is being said about him, is just that it reminds us where we came from, who we are, and it also educates the newer members

of the bar of what a long, rich. and congenial 1 2 organization this is, and bar is, and bench are. 3 And I -- I hate to think of a day where I come in and I don't have that same feeling, but nowhere else is it 4 5 exhibited but in this type of setting, unfortunately. Because it is really the only time where we take the time 6 7 to reflect back on the impact that people have had in our lives. 8 And not until Ben Landon mentioned it did I think 9 10 that I could possibly be called a groupie. Any time I 11 would see Craig, I would talk to him because my background is in music and the theater, and when he would come in, we 12 13 would talk about how much -- how important that was in our 14 lives and what are we doing and what concerts are we 15 performing in. And it just was so nice to talk to a 16 lawyer or a judge -- I would have been a judge definitely 17 then, but just to say that you had this whole wonderfully 18 developed life outside the practice of law. 19 And I think for someone to have been involved the

way he was in the law, but have this life and been able to be such a person; a kind, considerate and caring person when so many people think of lawyers as being anything but, it's nice to be able to have this opportunity to share all that with you. So he will be -- he will be missed and may his memory be a blessing to all of you. So

thank you for coming and sharing him with us. 1 2 So now would be the time where I would give the 3 opportunity for anyone here to speak. Please feel free. All I would ask -- oh. I direct the -- direct my remarks 4 5 to Mrs. Harris. I'm identifying you because we are 6 creating this record so that you may have it in the 7 future. Okay. Would like to say a few words? 8 MRS. HARRIS: Yep. I'm not a speaker, but I used to work on the third floor of this building in the 9 10 mental health office as a mental health caseworker, and I 11 do remember the day when I got in the elevator and he was 12 on the way to -- there used to be a law library up there. 13 I noticed him, but that was reciprocated later. 14 But anyhow, I used to prepare cases to present for 15 sanity hearings, so I was working with jaggary Judge 16 Greevy a lot when things would come up and one day I was 17 sitting at my desk in the mental health office here and I 18 got a call, it was Judge Greevy. He wanted to see me in 19 the chambers. I thought, oh, god, what did I do? 20 So I went down, sit down, please. Yes. I 21 understand you're dating the young Craig Harris. Yes. 22 Yes, I am. Well, I just want you to know that he is a 23 very nice young man. That was the whole thing. So I 24 thought you'd like that story. 25 I could hear Judge Greevy doing THE COURT:

THE COURT: Thank you.

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2 MR. KIESER: May it please the Court, Marty. 3 And before I went on the bench, Craig and I crossed paths 4 many times, particularly in real estate dealings, matters 5 of that nature. And I cannot talk too much about the 6 scout law, but Craig's practice of law was just excellent. 7 He saw that his clients always got justice.

8 Craig was one of the kindest persons you would 9 ever know. He was kind in all of the community activities 10 he did, but his kindness was such that it was based on his 11 love of, first, family, because he and I were both raising 12 families at the same time and, you know, just that's --13 that's a -- you know, that's what we dads talked about and 14 he just beamed with that. But the kindness he had for his 15 family extended into the community and I thank the family 16 for sharing him with the community because I know 17 sometimes there's a little strife there. It's a notion to 18 be at home and what should be done.

And he was always ready and quick to attribute his success both in marriage and family and everything else to his God, and he honored God with his singing and performance. And so Craig answered God's law in that he sought justice, he loved kindness, and he walked humbly with his God because he never asserted himself to be anything other than a good servant to his clients, and to CAMALA JORDAN
