### **OPINION AND ORDER**

AND NOW, this 28th day of June, 2024, before the Court is a Petition for Involuntary Termination of Parental Rights filed by Mother, Courtney Haines Baker, in regard to the rights of her child, MT, on February 15th, 2024. Mother seeks to terminate the parental rights of the children's biological father, Thomas Charles Richard Turner, as a prerequisite to having the children adopted by her husband, David Baker. A hearing on the Petition was held on June 25th, 2024. At the time of the hearing, the Petitioners, Courtney and David Baker, appeared with their counsel, Christina Dinges, Esquire. The Guardian Ad Litem, Johanna Berta, Esquire, appeared on behalf of the child. The natural Father, Thomas Charles Richard Turner, did not appear, though he was properly served with a copy of the Petition for Involuntary Termination of Parental Rights and notice of the hearing date and time. Although Father failed to appear, Jeana Longo, Esquire, was present on his behalf.

#### Finding of Facts

- 1. MT was born on December 22<sup>nd</sup>, 2014, in Lycoming County, Pennsylvania.
- 2. The child's mother is Courtney Haines who was born on March 24th, 1989.
- 3. The child's natural father is Thomas Charles Richard Turner.

- 4. The child currently resides with Mother and step-father, David Baker, at 1433 Locust Street, Jersey Shore, Lycoming County, Pennsylvania 17740.
- 5. The natural father, Thomas Charles Richard Turner, resides at 2331 West Fourth Street, Williamsport, Pennsylvania 17701.
- 6. Mother and Father were never married. The last time that the natural father had contact with the children was approximately 2018. The last time Father reached out to Mother regarding the child was 2019.
- 7. Natural Father has never paid child support and since 2019 has not provided any financial support for the child.
- 8. Mother has continued to reside in Lycoming County since her separation for Father.
  - 9. Father knows where Mother's brother currently resides.
  - 10. Mother has done nothing to block Father from contacting the child.
  - 11. Mother has maintained the same telephone number.
  - 12. Mother works with Father's mother.
  - 13. Mother and David Baker are recently married.
  - 14. David Baker has known the child for approximately five years.
- 15. The child is very close to David Baker and has a very loving relationship with him.
  - 16. There is no bond between the child and natural Father.
- 17. The natural Father, Thomas Charles Richard Turner, is not a member of the armed forces.

#### **Discussion**

Mother argues that the basis for termination in this case may be found in 23 Pa.C.S. §2511(a)(1), which provides as follows:

§2511. Grounds for Involuntary Termination

- (a) GENERAL RULE.--The rights of a parent in regard to a child may be terminated after a petition filed on any of the following grounds:
  - (1) The parent by conduct continuing for a period of at least six months immediately preceding the filing of the petition either has evidenced a settled purpose of relinquishing parental claim to a child or has refused or failed to perform parental duties.

A court may terminate parental rights under Section 2511(a)(1) where a parent demonstrates a settled purpose to relinquish parental claim to a child **or** fails to perform parental duties for at least six months prior to the filing of the termination petition.

In the Interest of C.S., 761 A.2d 1197, 1201 (Pa. Super. 2000). The Court should consider the entire background of the case and not simply:

mechanically apply the six month statutory provision. The court must examine the individual circumstances of each case and consider all explanations offered by the parent facing termination of his . . . parental rights, to determine if the evidence, in light of the totality of the circumstances, clearly warrants the involuntary termination.

<u>In re: B.N.M.</u>, 856 A.2d 847, 855 (Pa. Super. 2004), appeal denied, 582 Pa. 718, 872 A.2d 1200 (2005) citing <u>In re: D.J.S.</u>, 737 A.2d 283, 286 (Pa. Super. 1999).

In determining what constitutes parental duties, the Pennsylvania Supreme Court has said:

There is no simple or easy definition of parental duties. Parental duty is best understood in relation to the needs of a child. A child needs love, protection, guidance, and support. These needs, physical and emotional, cannot be met by a merely passive interest in the development of the child. Thus, this Court has held that the parental obligation is a positive duty which requires affirmative performance. This affirmative duty encompasses more than a financial obligation; it requires continuing interest in the child and a genuine effort to maintain communication and association with the child. Because a child needs more than a benefactor, parental duty requires that a parent "exert himself to take and maintain a place of importance in the child's life."

With these principles in mind, the question whether a parent has failed or refused to perform parental duties must be analyzed in relation to the particular circumstances of the case. A finding of abandonment, which has been characterized as "one of the most severe steps the court can take," will not be predicated upon parental conduct which is reasonably explained or which resulted from circumstances beyond the parent's control. It may only result when a parent has failed to utilize all available resources to preserve the parental relationship.

#### <u>In re: Burns</u>, 379 A.2d 535, 540 (Pa. 1977)(citations omitted).

The Court finds that as of the date of the Petition to Involuntary Terminate his parental rights, Father has failed to perform his parental duties for a period of time in excess of six (6) months and has evidenced a settled purpose of relinquishing his parental claim. Father has had absolutely no contact with the minor child since 2019. MT is currently 9 years of age and Father has been absent in her life for at least five years. Other than Father reaching out to Mother in 2019 to wish MT Happy Birthday, Father has had zero contacts with the child. Mother testified that Father walked past Mother and Child in the supermarket and he made no attempt to say hello and child did not recognize Father. Additionally, Father has failed to even bother to appear at this hearing to in any way defend the termination of his parental rights which clearly evidences his settled purpose to relinquish his parental rights.

As the statutory grounds for termination have been met, the Court must also consider the following:

23 Pa.C.S. § 2511(b) OTHER CONSIDERATIONS.—The Court in terminating the rights of a parent shall give primary consideration to the developmental, physical and emotional needs and welfare of the child. The rights of a parent shall not be terminated solely on the basis of environmental factors such as inadequate housing, furnishings, income, clothing and medical care if found to be beyond the control of the parent. With respect to any petition filed pursuant to subsection (a)(1), (6) or (8), the court shall not consider any efforts by the parent to remedy the conditions described therein which are first initiated subsequent to the giving of notice of the filing of the petition.

The Court must consider whether a bond exists between the child and parent, and whether termination would destroy an existing, necessary and beneficial relationship. <u>In</u> the Interest of C.S., supra, at 1202. When conducting a bonding analysis, the Court is not required to use expert testimony. <u>In re: K.K.R.-S.</u>, 958 A.2d 529, 533 (Pa. Super. 2008) (citing <u>In re: I.A.C.</u>, 897 A.2d 1200, 1208-1209 (Pa. Super. 2006)). "Above all else . . . adequate consideration must be given to the needs and welfare of the child." <u>In re: J.D.W.M.</u>, 810 A.2d 688, 690 (citing <u>In re: Child M.</u>, 681 A.2d 793 (Pa. Super. 1996), appeal denied, 546 Pa. 674, 686 A.2d 1307 (1996)). A parent's own feelings of love and affection for a child do not prevent termination of parental rights. <u>In re: L.M.</u>, 923 A.2d 505, 512 (Pa. Super. 2007).

Before granting a petition to terminate parental rights, it is imperative that a trial court carefully consider the *intangible* dimension of the needs and welfare of a child--the love, comfort, security and closeness--entailed in a parent-child relationship, as well as the tangible dimension. Continuity of relationships is also important to a child, for whom severance of close parental ties is usually extremely painful. The trial court, in considering what situation would best serve the children's needs and welfare, must examine the status of the natural parental bond to consider whether terminating the natural parents' rights would destroy something in

existence that is necessary and beneficial.

In the Interest of C.S., supra., at 1202 (citations omitted).

In the present case, Father does not have a bond with the child. This child doesn't

recognize Father and testified that David Baker is her Dad. It is clear that Father has no

bond with the child and termination of his rights would not destroy any existing

necessary and beneficial relationship as there currently exists no relationship between

Father and the child.

Conclusions of Law

1. The Court finds that Courtney Haines Baker has established by clear and

convincing evidence that Thomas Charles Richard Turner's parental rights should be

involuntarily terminated pursuant to 23 Pa.C.S. §2511(a)(1).

2. The Court finds that Courtney Haines Baker has established by clear and

convincing evidence that the developmental, physical and emotional needs and welfare of

MT will best be served by termination of Thomas Charles Richard Turner's parental

rights.

Accordingly, the Court will enter the attached Decree.

#### **DECREE**

**AND NOW,** this **28**<sup>th</sup> day of **June**, **2024**, after a hearing on the Petition for Involuntary Termination of the Parental Rights of Thomas Charles Richard Turner, held on June 25<sup>th</sup>, 2024, it is hereby ORDERED and DECREED:

- (1) That the parental rights of Thomas Charles Richard Turner be, and hereby are, terminated as to the children above-named;
- (2) That the welfare of the children will be promoted by adoption; that all requirements of the Adoption Act have been met; that the child may be the subject of adoption proceedings without any further notice to the natural father.

### NOTICE TO NATURAL PARENTS PENNSYLVANIA ADOPTION MEDICAL HISTORY REGISTRY

This is to inform you about an adoption law provision relating to medical history information. As the birth parent of a Pennsylvania born child who is being, or was ever adopted in the past, you have the opportunity to voluntarily place on file medical history information. The information which you choose to provide could be important to this child's present and future medical care needs.

The law makes it possible for you to file current medical information, but it also allows you to update the information as new medically related information becomes available. Requests to release the information will be honored if the request is submitted by a birth child 18 years of age or older. The law also permits that the court honor requests for information submitted by the adoptive parents or legal guardians of adoptees who are not yet 18 years of age. All information will be maintained and distributed in a manner that fully protects your right to privacy.

You may obtain the appropriate form for you to file medical history information by contacting the Adoption Medical History Registry. Registry staff are available to answer your questions. Please contact them at:
